I know I wasn't the first, or the last, student to walk into Mrs. Doran's biology room suffering from adolescence. Carrying around unhealthy shame, not sure where my boundaries existed apart from peers, and a general lack of comfort and confidence in who I was, all seemed to disappear in her presence and in her class. Everyone was welcomed, everyone was safe, everyone was respected, and everyone knew the path to success- Be Ready! This almost daily effort toward the next B.R. would pave the way for success later. She allowed one drop out of five which demonstrated her acceptance of our imperfections. One bad day on a B.R. did not knock you off your game.

She is THE reason I majored in Biology. It was the one subject where I felt a connection which would not have existed otherwise. It is not that I struggled in other subjects, or even that I didn't have talents toward other subjects. I just didn't have connection with any other subject. Teaching students a healthy dynamic with learning is where the master teacher makes an impact. In the safety of Mrs. Doran's room, I could try hard and not fear failure. I was respected for who I was, even though I felt so inadequate with life. Learning was my responsibility, and I had to earn my success. Underlying all of that, is her most compelling quality. Mrs. Doran had a way of making you want to step toward her, yet she was quick to meet you where you were. She was a person who made you want to be better, yet unconditionally loved and accepted you as you are. She was eager to get beside you on your journey as soon as you took the first step. And the journey with Mrs. Doran would continued well after senior biology. Following graduation, Mrs. Doran was there to offer wisdom during a difficult breakup, guide me toward summer employment, and meet us in Atlanta for a Jimmy Buffett concert. How cool is that?

It is impossible to exactly measure how well a life is lived. The total impact we may have on others will never be known. With Gayle Doran, while we cannot comprehend the totality of her impact, we do know that she made people better. She loved life in a grounded, balanced manner that inspires us and helps us keep things in perspective. I am grateful for knowing her and I pray for her impact to continue blessing Chris, Stacey, her grandchildren, and the thousands of DWS students so lucky to have had her.
