A native of Macon, GA, Mr. Spooner attended Mercer University, and has lived in Albany since 1980, where he was of the Presbyterian faith, and was a volunteer with the campaign to elect Sanford Bishop as congressman. When Congressman Bishop was elected to office Mr. Spooner went on to serve in his Albany office. In addition to working with Congressman Bishop he also volunteered with the Phoebe Putney Memorial Hospital Help Line for several years, and was also employed with King Tut's Jewelry Co. Mr. Spooner owned and operated Albany Sports Cards and Collectables for 10 years at the Albany Flea Market. He was an avid reader as well as an avid collector of coins, sports cards, post cards and other collectables. Mr. Spooner donated a number of his collectables to the Albany Historical Society.
