



Roderick L. Ford Obituary

September 2, 1953 - August 1, 2006

Roderick Lee Ford, 52, of Carroll Valley, PA died Monday, July 31, 2006 at the Gettysburg Hospital in Gettysburg, PA. His funeral service will be Saturday 2 PM at Crown Hill Cemetery with full military honors. Rev. Joe Carr will officiate. Born Sept. 2, 1953 in Oconee County, S.C., he was the son of the late Elijah and Zola Osbourn Ford. He was the devoted husband to his wife Janice Gossett Ford for 26 years. Mr. Ford grew up in Westminster, S.C. and Macon, Ga., graduating from Northeast High School in Macon. He attended Mercer University in Macon, Ga., and then worked for the retail industry for several years. Mr. Ford entered the United States Army in April of 1982 at Fort Gordon, Ga., and then served with the 24th Infantry Division at Fort Stewart, Ga., where he was deployed to Iraq for Desert Storm. Mr. Ford was then assigned to the 5th Signal Command in Worms, Germany. He moved to this area with his assignment to Site "R" then was assigned to the 552nd Signal Company in Korea and returned to the states for his last assignment at HQ, INSCOM, Fort Belvoir, Va. After his retirement in 2003, Mr. Ford worked briefly for Halifax Corporation before joining the federal government at the 302nd Signal Battalion at Fort Detrick, Md. He received numerous awards and commendations during his military career, including Meritorious Services Medals, Army Commendation Medals, Overseas Service Ribbons, National Defense Service Medals and the Kuwait Liberation Medal and he posthumously received the Commander's Civilian Service Award. Mr. Ford was a member of the Baptist Church of Macon and attended various military

chapels. He was a member of the Fairfield Amvets. He was preceded in death by a brother, Richard N. Ford. Surviving in addition to his wife are one son, Roderick Lee Ford Jr. of Atlanta, Ga. and two daughters, Hannah Morgan Lee Ford and Amelia Laura Lee Ford, both at home, mother and father-in-law, Frank and Virginia Gossett, Putney.

What can I say about Roderick Ford?

He was among the most professional people I've ever met. Roderick, Rod, to those who worked with him was clearly an NCO, a retired NCO, but still always an NCO in his heart. Being an NCO was extremely important to him. He lived the Army NCO creed even as a civilian ?No one is more professional than I. I am a Noncommissioned Officer, a leader of Soldiers. As a Noncommissioned Officer, I realize that I am a member of a time honored corps, which is known as "The Backbone of the Army". Yes that was Rod alright; he believed it and he lived it. He was so much an NCO in fact that at times I know he was frustrated with my calmer, gentler, and yes, usually slower? civilian way of doing things. Rod tried to come to terms with his role as a civilian. I can remember after serious talks in my office, he would lean back in his chair, smirk and chuckle in his unique way and say ?I'm trying, I really am?. In the end, I think I learned more from him than he from me. Even though it was Rod's way to push hard to get the right thing done, Rod knew patience was the key. Rod understood the laws of physics, with enough time and pressure, mountains could be moved. Ever so slowly Rod was able to move his mountains.

And yes, Rod was tough, to deny that would be to deny who he was. It was alright though because everyone around him knew that he was just as fair as he was tough. I probably saw Rod more than any other supervisor, he was just so dedicated to making sure that his people were taken care of. I guess that?s part of being an NCO too. Rod would frequently call me at night if he was bothered about the welfare of one of his Soldiers. Rod?s moral courage was almost unbelievable to me. When he knew something was right he didn?t mind taking on the whole world.
